Eight percent rate increase planned for September

The Board of Directors, based on recommendations from management, has approved an 8% rate increase to take effect starting with the electric bill you receive at the end of September. The Service Availability charge has been \$35 per month since our last rate change in 2010. It will increase to \$45 per month. The other part of your bill – the kilowatt hour (kWh) rate – is increasing only slightly, from the current average of \$0.1064 per kWh, to \$0.1104 per kWh.


The reason for this is that most of the costs we pay to build, operate, and maintain a reliable electric system are fixed. Whether you use I kWh or I,000 kWh, we still have to build, operate, and maintain the same amount of equipment and back office support. Even after the upcoming increase, we will continue to have the lowest rates among Ohio's 24 electric cooperatives.

Please plan to attend our Saturday morning, June 3, annual meeting where I'll discuss the increase in greater detail. If you are unable to attend you can watch the live stream as it happens or recording of the meeting that will be posted after the meeting. PEAK ALERT SEASON IS HERE

A peak alert occurs when all of Ohio's electric cooperatives approach a new peak demand for electricity usage. This is important because Midwest Electric purchases the electricity we use based on the total kilowatt hours of electricity our members use. When we set a new usage peak it can mean a higher rate for electricity next year.

We share peak alerts on our social media channels and website. We ask members to help out by reducing usage during those times (reducing the demand) when everyone is using more electricity. A peak alert is not a shortage of electricity. It is a way to manage the cost of purchasing higher cost electricity. By lowering usage during times of peak demand, members reap the benefit in the form of a lower cost for power.

How you can help!

- Raise your thermostat if possible to where comfortable. The U.S. Department of Energy recommends 78 degrees.
- Turn off lights and appliances you aren't using. It's a waster of energy and your money.
- Delay doing laundry, running the dishwasher or using other major appliances until later in the evening.
- In the summer, take advantage of using the outdoor grill to keep cooking heat outside.

By working together, we can curb the demand for electric power. This teamwork is a winwin for everyone, as the cooperative consistently works toward the goal of keeping the cost of power as low as possible
